# **Tips from the Digital Coast Academy**


### Plan for a Resilient Recovery Before a Disaster Strikes

Local governments are on the front lines of disaster recovery. It is their responsibility to both plan and manage all aspects of their community's recovery. In Hawai`i, the local Sea Grant developed guidance focused on helping Hawaiian communities be in a better position to recover from the negative impacts associated with sea level rise and other coastal hazards. This guide can serve as a road map for other communities to create their own plan.

Sea Grant staff learned some tips during the development process: First, preparedness takes time, so be patient! Second, it's important to talk to local community members and understand their concerns. This dialogue leads to guidance and protocols tailored to the community.
