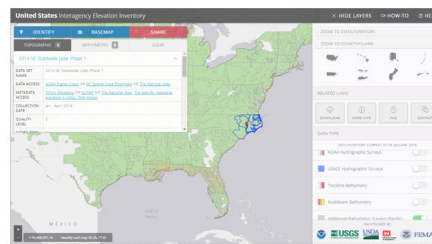

Got Lidar?

Searching for any type of data can lead down a confusing path filled with questions about quality, quantity, and sources. Lidar data, a hot commodity in the data world, are available from a variety of sources, but searching through a large number of sites is time consuming.

Enter our recommendation—start with the two superheroes of lidar websites. The U.S. Geological Survey's National Map allows for [specific](#) or bulk

Expanding Coastal Opportunities for People with Disabilities

Throughout the nation's coastal zone, state programs are breaking down barriers to coastal access. Three New England research reserves worked with Deaf-community teachers and interpreters to add the words "estuary" and "watershed" to American Sign Language. These reserves are also hosting field trips for students from schools for the deaf. Meanwhile, the Nation's Coastal Zone Management Programs are making trails more accessible for all in Puerto Rico and California and improving water access in Virginia and Mississippi. Both the research reserves and coastal programs are working to make their restrooms compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act. NOAA and its partners believe everyone deserves to enjoy the coasts and estuaries!

Tips from the Digital Coast Academy

Flood Assessment Tool for Stormwater Systems

Increasing coastal flooding poses a unique challenge for community stormwater management systems. Inundation from high tides and storm surge can partially or completely submerge stormwater pipes and outfalls, causing backups that contribute to street-level flooding. The combination of rainfall runoff and coastal flooding translates into more widespread or prolonged inundation than what normally occurs when these events happen independently.

To effectively tackle this complex issue, communities need to know when they should expect to see coastal flooding, how long it will last, and how this might compromise their stormwater management systems. "[Adapting Stormwater Management for Coastal Floods](#)" is a web-based decision-support resource that provides timely and relevant information to address these concerns.
