Reduced Flooding AND Cheaper Insurance Premiums

You read that right—now let us explain.

When communities reduce flood risk, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) often can provide policyholders with discounts on their flood insurance premiums. Participant communities in FEMA's Community Rating System receive credit to determine the amount. One way to earn credit is by preserving floodplains as open space and implementing land use policies that 1) prevent development and 2) maintain naturally protective features.

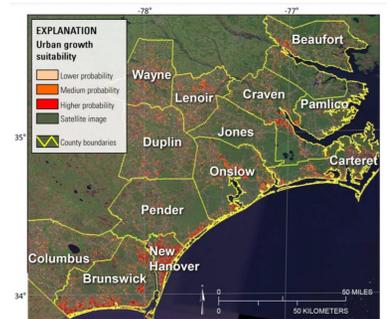
NOAA can help you explore these possibilities with its [“how-to”](#) guide, a step-by-step approach for earning credit for floodplains that are already protected, and guidance for identifying places where additional credit could be earned.

Stories from Your Peers

Modeling Future Development for Eastern North Carolina

Coastal managers in this region had a three-pronged wish list: how to best promote sustainable economic growth while preserving local military bases and protecting vital ecosystems. Using census data and multiple land cover data sets, they created predictive urban growth models to simulate where population growth is likely to occur. The results provided the framework needed to simultaneously address each of these goals.

Leverage FEMA Programs for Local Success

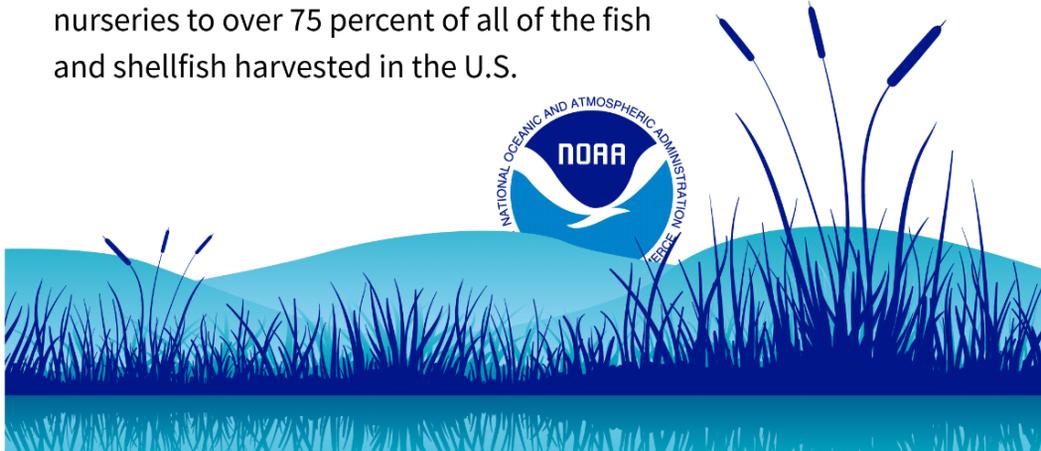
State, tribal, and local governments are eligible for non-emergency funding from FEMA if they have an approved hazard mitigation plan. Equally good news: FEMA has resources available to help communities complete or update their hazard mitigation plans.
